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Academisation of Schools

This Council notes, with concern, the proposal in the recently published education White Paper, "Educational Excellence Everywhere" which will force all schools in Plymouth to become academies, irrespective of the school's wishes.

This council meeting notes that the White Paper's proposals -

- would remove the requirement of schools to elect parent governors;
- would require the transfer of land and buildings of such schools to central ownership by the Secretary of State;
- do not include any say for parents and local communities over the future status of local schools:
- requires lengthy and costly conversion exercises.

This council meeting further notes -

- over 80% of children attending schools in Plymouth attend schools that are rated by Ofsted as "good" or "outstanding";
- the invaluable role of parent governors and the local authority acting as "critical friends" to both support and hold to account head teachers and schools;
- the comments of 58 head teachers from across Plymouth and Devon who wrote to the Secretary of State for Education urging her to "start listening and stop the rhetoric" and those of The National Association of Head teachers.

This council believes -

No single system of school organisation has a monopoly on success and that the model as proposed by the White Paper would not deliver the improvement in schools standards and outcomes that this council wishes to see.

This Council meeting therefore resolves to -

- a) Ask the Leader of the Council to write to the Secretary of State for Education expressing the concerns of this council as set out in this motion about the proposals to force all schools to become academies in Plymouth;
- b) Ask the Leader of the Council to write to our local MPs expressing the council's concerns and to seek their views on the proposal;

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c) Ask the lead member for Children and Young People to ensure engagement with head teachers, school governors, professional representatives, parents and the wider local community to raise awareness of the Government's proposals.

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Family Holidays & School Fines

Make Fair Transitional State Pension Arrangements for 1950's Women

This Council calls upon the Government to make fair transitional state pension arrangements for all women born on or after 6th April 1951, who have unfairly borne the burden of the increase to the State Pension Age (SPA) with lack of appropriate notification.

Hundreds of thousands of women had significant pension changes imposed on them by the Pensions Acts of 1995 and 2011 with little/no/personal notification of the changes. Some women had only two years notice of a six-year increase to their state pension age.

Many women born in the 1950's are living in hardship. Retirement plans have been shattered with devastating consequences. Many of these women are already out of the labour market, caring for elderly relatives, providing childcare for grandchildren, or suffer discrimination in the workplace so struggle to find employment. Women born in this decade are suffering financially. These women have worked hard, raised families and paid their tax and national insurance with the expectation that they would be financially secure when reaching 60. It is not the pension age itself that is in dispute – it is widely accepted that women and men should retire at the same time. The issue is that the rise in the women's state pension age has been too rapid and has happened without sufficient notice being given to the women affected, leaving women with no time to make alternative arrangements.

This Council calls upon the Government to reconsider transitional arrangements for women born on or after 6th April 1951, so that women do not live in hardship due to pension changes they were not told about until it was too late to make alternative arrangements.

- (I) Request the Chief Executive to issue this statement as forcefully as possible in all forms and in all outlets available to us.
- (2) Request the Chief Executive to actively engage with all partners and stakeholders on this issue to send this message to the widest possible audience in Plymouth.
- (3) Request the Chief Executive ensures all Councillors and staff have the necessary training to ensure they are able to inform residents and partners how to report hate crimes and how to access support.
- (4) Request that the Chief Executive ensures all Councillors are aware of the schedule of Citizenship ceremonies and investigate appropriate measures to enable Councillors to attend ceremonies in order to welcome new citizens to the city.
