National Developments



- As at 18 March EU/UK were still deadlocked on the Northern Ireland backstop, last week:-
- The withdrawal agreement and political framework were rejected a second time (but there may yet be a third meaningful vote)
- Parliament voted against leaving without a deal and to extend article 50 but as it stands no deal is still the default option
- Working assumption for us is 'no deal' until either
 a) a deal with the EU is in place, or b) article 50 is withdrawn or postponed

Ministry of Housing, Communities and Local Government (MHCLG) expectations



Checklist of things MHCLG expected to have in place:-

- All the statutory services for which the council is responsible
- All regulatory services for which the council is responsible
- The impact (direct or indirect) of any Border areas
- The impact on supply chains
- Data handling
- Local partnership working
- Communications

Dep't of Health & Social Care



Actions to prepare for a 'no deal' scenario. EU Exit Operational Readiness Guidance lists 7 areas of concern.

- supply of medicines and vaccines;
- supply of medical devices and clinical consumables;
- supply of non-clinical consumables, goods and services;
- workforce;
- reciprocal healthcare;
- research and clinical trials; and
- data sharing, processing and access.

Supply of medicines and vaccines



- Three-quarters of the medicines and vaccines we use come from or via the EU
- DHSC is working with industry and the health and care system to maintain supplies to the UK
- Securing freight, buffer stocks, stockpiling and warehousing, and regulatory flexibility will help to ensure the continuation of medical supplies
- Local stockpiling is unnecessary, important that patients order their repeat prescriptions as normal
- The supply of medicines and medical products should be uninterrupted

Supply of medical devices and clinical consumables



- All suppliers that regularly source products from EU countries asked to review their supply chains
- Working to ensure there is sufficient roll-on/rolloff freight capacity to enable medicines and medical products to move freely into the UK
- No need for health and adult social care providers to stockpile additional medical devices and clinical consumables beyond business as usual stock levels
- We have identified local risks around PPE equipment and nuclear material
- We are working on local protocol to enable pooling of PPE equipment

Supply of non-clinical consumables, goods and services



- Reviewing and managing relevant categories at national level including food and laundry services
- Supply chain reviews across the health and social care system to assess commercial risks
- Engaging with suppliers and industry experts to identify and plan for any supply disruption
- Guidance pending, on basis of NHS selfassessment tool results, e.g. substitute food items
- Local business continuity plans have been updated, all suppliers (500+) contacted and risk assessed
- Fuel plans in place and now liaising with providers to identify staff mobility requirements

Workforce



- Less exposed than other areas as EU care workers make up smaller proportion of our workforce, but may be high in some sectors
- Recruitment to care sector generally challenging and workforce turn over is high, need to consider cross sectoral competition for labour
- Settlement scheme aimed at persuading EU migrants already resident here to stay, immigration bill includes temporary scheme for care workers
- Considered a high risk as contract headroom is minimal and the need to fund any additional pay would impact on contract viability

Reciprocal healthcare, research, clinical trials and data sharing.



- Reciprocal healthcare we will signpost
 Government advice to UK residents travelling to
 the EU and to EU nationals living in the UK
- Research successful bids for EU programme funding until the end of 2020 will receive their full financial allocation for the lifetime of the project
- Clinical trials no action required around clinical networks, organisations should contact trial sponsors and follow the normal process for seeking regulatory approval
- Data sharing DELT have necessary continuity arrangements in place issue around cloud storage

Summary of key local risks and mitigation



- Brittany ferries operating freight contract via
 Millbay- no disruption to port is anticipated
- Business continuity all social care providers contacted and advised about need to ensure business continuity plans are in place.
- Workforce vulnerabilities understood and communicated to government
- Proactive discussion with Health around pooling PPE ongoing, e.g. latex gloves and other infection control.
- Fuel plans in place and discussed with Livewell and providers to identify staff mobility requirements.
