## Purpose of Report

The 26 August 2023 will mark the end of the first 100 days of the new Labour administration. Changes are underway here in Plymouth as the Leader and Cabinet Members have come together with officers and partners to address the areas which are so important to the people who live and work in the city.

This report identifies the key activities which have been rolled out in the administration's first 81 days in power, and which are already improving the lives of residents.

## Priorities

The Cabinet have identified six priority areas which will be delivered as a part of the Corporate Plan and have highlighted the importance of retaining a focus in all of our activities on Plymouth being a great place to grow up and grow old, and on minimising the impact of the cost of living crisis.

- Working with the Police to tackle crime and anti-social behaviour
- Fewer potholes, cleaner, greener streets and transport
- Build more homes – for social rent and affordable ownership
- Green investment, jobs, skills and better education
- Working with the NHS to provide better access to health, care and dentistry
- Keeping children, adults and communities safe

The Corporate Plan also reflects the Council's focus not just on what it delivers, but also on the approach to delivery. The management of quality and performance, alongside value for money and good stewardship of public assets are highlighted as essential. The relationship with both our staff and our communities is a key measure of an effective Council, as is recognising the importance of prevention and early intervention in achieving positive change. The Council's ability to properly represent its communities both locally and nationally is also recognised.

# 100 DAYS OF ACTION

Cabinet



Work has begun to deliver a fairer, greener city where everyone does their bit, making Plymouth a great place to grow-up and grow old, whilst minimising the impact of the cost of living crisis.

Plymouth remains a city with so much to offer, but for many, those opportunities can feel a world away.

As we mark the first 100 days of action under the new administration, the council is committed to tackling deep-rooted inequalities and has already delivered changes to help achieve a fairer Plymouth - one where all of our residents feel part of Britain's Ocean City.

### Immediate Action on Armada Way

Within hours of becoming the Leader of the Council Councillor Evans OBE overturned the decision of previous Leader, Councillor Richard Bingley, in relation to the Armada Way scheme.

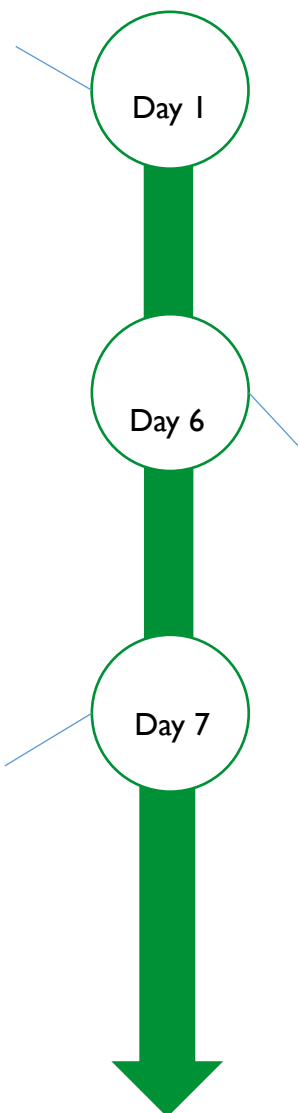
This means the current scheme will not be implemented and new options to [regenerate Armada Way](#) would come forward.

### Heritage Improvements

Landmarks across Plymouth's waterfront are getting some TLC as part of the National Marine Park's ambition to encourage more people to use them.

Important heritage features at Tinside Pool, Mount Batten and the Garden Battery at Mount Edgcombe Park will receive significant but sensitive makeovers designed to reinvigorate these amazing waterside locations and show off these stunning buildings and open them up to a new generation of users and uses

Council Leader Tudor Evans OBE said: "These features play a huge part of our history and it's only right that they are being looked at with fresh eyes to make sure they are part of our future.



### Derriford District Centre

Work will start imminently on the much-anticipated Derriford District Centre following an investment deal to close a funding gap.

Council leader Tudor Evans signed a decision worth just over £1 million which will unblock the project which has been hit by rising construction costs.

The project is being forward funded by the Council to the tune of £18.9 million.

Council leader Tudor Evans OBE said: "This administration is all about getting things done and attracting new investment into the city. We have quickly reviewed a number stalled projects and this decision will be the first of many to get the city's investment pipeline flowing again.

**Household Support Fund**

Plymouth City Council has received more than £4.5 million of funding to use over the coming year through the Household Support Fund to support residents affected by the cost of living crisis.

The funding will support those most likely to be affected including families, single adults and people with disabilities that are on low incomes, pensioners, care experienced young people, unpaid carers and people living in temporary accommodation.

Councillor Chris Penberthy, Cabinet Member for Housing, Cooperative Development and Communities, said:

“Plymouth residents are struggling with the rising cost of living, we have just heard of ongoing double figure inflation in basic food stuffs. For many the very basics are becoming unaffordable, with many parents worrying about how they will feed their children in the school holidays. The fund will enable us to support vulnerable people of all ages, including those who fall through the gaps because they are exempt from benefits or other forms of support.

**Platinum Parkway Wins Award**

The recently opened Platinum Parkway, one of Plymouth’s biggest ever transport improvement schemes, has won another regional award. The scheme, has been named Transportation Project of the Year in this year’s CIHT (Chartered Institution of Highways and Transportation) South West Regional Awards. Councillor Mark Coker, Cabinet Member for Strategic Planning and Infrastructure, said: “We’re really proud to have received this accolade. The awards celebrate the very best the region offers in highways and transport and the contribution that projects like this can make to our daily lives.”

**Mount Wise Pool**

Charges that had been planned for the popular Mount Wise swimming pools will not be introduced, says the new Council administration.

As part of the 2023/24 budget proposals, it was announced last year that swimmers could be charged to use the outdoor pools this summer. However, in one of its first decisions, the new Council administration has scrapped the proposals, keeping the Mount Wise pools free to access during the cost-of-living crisis.

Councillor Sally Haydon, Cabinet Member for Community Safety, Libraries and Cemeteries and Crematoria, said: “Things are really tough for so many families across the city. Many can’t afford to have days out and trips with the family. Where we can keep things free or low-cost, we really should try.



### Family Hubs and Start for Life

Plymouth City Council has been awarded a share of £300 million that the Government has set aside for 75 local authorities to support the development of Family Hubs and establish Start for Life support that will help families as their children grow. The Start for Life offer, supporting pregnancy through to four years old, is the first stage of the Family Hub programme to go live.

Councillor Jemima Laing, Deputy Leader of Plymouth City Council, said: "We want all children in Plymouth to have the best possible start in life and to ensure that parents and carers feel supported by their communities. The first few years of life are absolutely crucial so it's fantastic to be launching the new Start for Life offer at four of our new Family Hubs.

### Ageing Well in Plymouth

Plymouth is set to become a more welcoming city for older people in new plans laid out by Plymouth City Council. The Council is committing to ambitious plans for Plymouth to become a city where people age well, where older residents are supported and empowered to live life to the fullest.

A city-wide steering group will be created to develop an ageing well programme for Plymouth.

Councillor Mary Aspinall, Cabinet Member for Health and Adult Social Care, said: "I'm really excited by the potential that this has to make sure that Plymouth is an accessible and inclusive city where everyone can thrive regardless of their age. Let's face it, we are all getting older, and we all deserve a good quality of life, whether you are as fit as a fiddle, or have daily challenges to face. The plans we are going to be developing will help to make sure that residents are supported to age well, to have a good quality of life and play an active role with friends and families, and in the community.

### Cost of Living Crisis

Plymouth City Council's new administration is to step up support for families impacted by the rising cost of living, Council Leader Tudor Evans has pledged.

A report to new administration's first Cabinet meeting outlined a renewed approach to responding to the cost of living crisis, including launching a new cost of living working group to oversee an action plan for supporting those most affected.

The Council works closely with a wide range of partners and specialist agencies to identify those who need support, signpost help that is available and work to address the barriers that prevent people receiving all the support they are eligible for.

### Plymouth Marine Business Technology Centre

Plymouth Marine Business Technology Centre is bowing out on top after delivering an impressive set of results that puts Plymouth and South Devon at the forefront of marine innovation.

Council leader Tudor Evans OBE said: "This centre has turbo-charged a really exciting sector where Plymouth is building a reputation for world class innovation. "I secured the City Deal in 2014 which led to Oceansgate becoming a hub for marine industries and the Marine Business Technology Centre was developed as a service to support existing tenants and would be tenants. It has laid strong foundations for the success of the Plymouth and South Devon Freeport and 80 per cent of the pipeline of businesses that are looking to invest have come from the programme. That's skilled green and marine jobs secured and developed for this area."

**Purple Flag**

The city has been awarded the prestigious Purple Flag accreditation for its evening and night-time economy for another culture, whilst promoting the safety and wellbeing of visitors and residents.

A large number of organisations work together to make Plymouth a welcoming and successful destination including the Council, Devon and Cornwall Police, pubs, restaurants, sports and entertainment venues, retail and transport operators, dedicated street pastors and taxi Community Safety, Libraries, Cemeteries marshals

Councillor Sally Haydon, said: “We are delighted that the city has been awarded the Purple Flag accreditation for another year, and to be recognised for all of the initiatives that we have in the city is amazing news. “We have worked collaboratively across the city with different organisations to help keep Plymouth safe at night,.

**Community Diagnostic Centre**

Plymouth has been announced as a site for one of eight new Community Diagnostic Centres due to open. The new Diagnostic Centre will be located in Plymouth’s West End, helping regenerate the city centre and provide wider access to critical diagnostic tests.

Councillor Mark Lowry, Cabinet member for Finance said: “On the first day of our administration we submitted our application for this project and from that moment we have worked non-stop to get this project back on track. Clearly this is great news for the city centre and for the health of our residents.

**Preventing Plastic Pollution**

Our amazing Preventing Plastic Pollution Project has come to an end on World Oceans Day.

Here in Plymouth we’ve achieved so much to help keep our city, and crucially our seas, free of plastic pollution.

Councillor Tom Briars-Delve, Cabinet member for the Environment and Climate Change, said: “The Preventing Plastic Pollution Project has made such a difference in Plymouth and while it’s sad that it has come to a close, we should be immensely proud of all it has achieved.

**PWC Good Growth Report**

The latest report produced by PwC has ranked Plymouth’s economy at 5th highest in the UK for Good Growth, with particularly strong performance in income distribution, work-life balance and transport.

In addition, Plymouth was also ranked 1st for the most improved city, with the highest overall change in the Good Growth score from last year to the current year.

The work undertaken by this Labour Authority in our Resurgam Programme and Inclusive growth was mentioned as a case study.

**Dental Taskforce**

Task force is being set-up to tackle the city’s growing dental crisis, following a commitment from the new Council administration.

There are currently over 21,000 people in Plymouth waiting for an NHS dentist. This is an increase of nearly 120% over the past five years.

Councillor Mary Aspinall, Cabinet Member for Health and Adult Social Care at Plymouth City Council, said: “The time for posturing is over. We need action. We need to increase access to urgent and emergency dental care, we need to improve access to services for the most vulnerable children and adults and those with complex needs and we need to expand current oral health improvement initiatives.

### Armada Way

The Leader of Plymouth City Council, is calling for an end to the current judicial review process, enabling the Council to crack on with the much-needed regeneration.

Councillor Tudor Evans, said: "The city centre is looking awful and whilst we obviously want to move forward with the clean-up of the felled trees and stumps as soon as we can, we don't want to be held-up any further once that is done.

"We must not conflate what happened in the past with the future. We must rebuild and focus on how we can make our city centre, green, attractive and buzzing for the businesses."

### NetZero – UK100

Plymouth City Council's new administration has renewed its commitment to achieving net zero carbon emissions by 2030 by committing to UK100.

UK100 is a network of ambitious local leaders who have pledged to lead a rapid transition to net zero - with clean air in their communities - ahead of the government's legal target of 2050.

Councillor Tom Briars-Delve, Cabinet Member for the Environment and Climate Change, added: "Net Zero is a monumentally important task and the collaboration with other local authorities offered by UK100 membership will help Plymouth reach it.

### Action to support our Armed Forces

Coinciding with Armed Forces Week, the Skills Launchpad Plymouth team hosted their first military employment showcase event. The event helped connect over 80 serving members of HM Armed Forces, veterans and their families with local employment opportunities.

Councillor Sally Cresswell, Cabinet Member for Education, Skills and Apprenticeships said: "Skills and jobs are a key priority for Plymouth, we recognise that the high-level transferrable skills of members of HM Armed Forces as they career transition from the services can provide fantastic solutions for our local employers who are seeking to grow their skilled workforce."

### Mayflower Street Reopened


A programme of work included the installation of new large bus shelters as well as a new bus stop to make more space available for buses as well as changes to the pavements and kerbs. The scheme is designed to improve public transport infrastructure, bus journey times as well as reduce emissions.

Councillor Mark Coker, Cabinet Member for Transport said: "This new administration is committed to making the city centre greener whenever and however we can. If we are serious about changing travel habits, we need to make greener forms of travel a more attractive option.

"I would like to thank the shops and traders in and around this street for being so patient while the work to improve Mayflower Street has been carried out."

### Action on Potholes

Innovation continues to be explored by Plymouth City Council in its fight against potholes, with the trial of a new, quick, low carbon, road patching system. A six month trial has begun to trial a Velocity road patching system, a machine that can carry out permanent, durable repairs at a fraction of the cost and, because there's no excavation, no waste and no heat involved, it creates a significantly lower carbon footprint. Today, Councillor Mark Coker, Cabinet Member for Strategic Planning and Transport, He said: "We made a promise to fill more potholes more quickly to help keep our roads safe and the city moving. "This new machine means there's no excavation, no waste, often no need for road closures, and repairs are ready to drive on in minutes. The repairs cost a third of the price of traditional techniques, and because there's no heat involved, it's also exceptionally low on carbon emissions.

### Sustainable Transport – Beryl Bikes

"Plymouth people have well and truly got on their e-bikes with 15,000 journeys made on Beryl bikes since their launch.

Councillor Mark Coker, Cabinet Member for Transport, said: "This scheme has got off to a flying start. Together all these users have cycled over 40,000km, that's equivalent to around the world.

Connect Plymouth has been funded through the Department of Transport's Transforming Cities Fund, which aims to change people's travel habits by making it as easy as possible for people to choose low carbon options to get about.

**Council Leader Tudor Evans OBE** said: "Art and culture is a key driver for us – in whatever form it takes. Culture is critical to a thriving, exciting city where people want to live, where they go out, do stuff, see stuff, encourage families, children, communities to get involved in performing or creating and learn be curious.

Celebrating half a century in business, Brittany Ferries has partnered with this year's British Firework Championships, which will once again be hosted in the city of Plymouth on the Hoe.

Jemima Laing, Deputy Leader of the Council, and Cabinet Member for Events at Plymouth City Council said: "We're so grateful for the support that Brittany Ferries – who are currently celebrating their 50th year of service - are providing for the event.

**Housing Care Experienced Young People**  
Young people who have been in care in Plymouth will benefit from a new accommodation facility which gives them a taste of adulthood and independence while ensuring there's support on hand.

Plymouth City Council has transformed a disused building into self-contained flats for young people who are ready to live more independently, with a mix of four 'training flats' for 16 and 17 year olds, and eight flats for young people aged 18 and over. The accommodation will have a 24-hour staff presence to offer support and guidance to the young people living there, enabling those who are leaving care to still be supported but to manage their own homes.

Councillor Jemima Laing, Cabinet Member for Children's Social Care, visited the new flats this week as they undergo the finishing touches and said: "These new flats are absolutely fantastic, offering a brilliant new accommodation option for care experienced young people in Plymouth as they begin their journey to independence."

### Money for Potholes

Pothole repairs have been given a major financial boost after Council Leader Tudor Evans released money to the highways maintenance budget.

The new administration pledged to prioritise investing in repairing more of the city's potholes more quickly and the £4.5m capital budget and maintenance programme has been realigned to release money to tackle potholes using more innovative and cost-effective repair techniques.

Councillor Tudor Evans, Leader of Plymouth City Council, said:

"I know that the state of our roads and pavements is a huge concern for people in Plymouth, it dominates my inbox. We have promised to do all we can to carry out repairs and keep our city moving, the budget allocations support this commitment.

### Action on Armada Way

The stumps of the felled trees in Armada Way are being removed and heras fencing will be further pulled back this week, as part of the new administration's push to clear up the city centre.

Leader of Plymouth City Council, Councillor Tudor Evans said:

"We took control of the Council just last month and since then we have been pushing forward to take control of Armada Way and sort out the current mess.

"I know that local traders are frustrated at the length of time it is taking to clean it up and the impact it is having on their businesses. I absolutely share their sense of frustration.

### Progress against Priorities

Plymouth City Council's new administration has hit the ground running in delivering its commitments to the city, a progress report to Cabinet shows.

A new Corporate Plan setting out the Council's new priorities for Plymouth was agreed by the Full Council but work to deliver them has been under way throughout the six weeks the new administration has been at the helm.

Council Leader Tudor Evans OBE said "Plymouth faces a number of significant challenges and we have not wasted any time in getting stuck into addressing them through the renewed priorities for the city. ### Get Fit and Fed

The popular Fit and Fed programme is returning to Plymouth this summer, supporting families by providing funded holiday club places for eligible children. The aim is to provide children and young people with the chance to get active and try new activities, as well as to provide them with a healthy nutritious meal.

Councillor Sue Dann, Cabinet Member for Cabinet Member for Customer Services, Sport, Leisure and HR and OD, said: "We know that families are really feeling the pressure of the rising cost of living and this is something we're working to tackle by developing a new Cost of Living action plan that will support Plymouth residents.

### Independent Living

Plymouth City Council is set to make a commitment to older residents who need more help to live independently.

More than 160 people currently live in the city's seven Extra Care housing schemes which give people who need some extra support the opportunity to maintain and enjoy an active, independent life

Councillor Mary Aspinall, Cabinet Member for Health and Adult Social Care, said: "These services are so important to older residents in Plymouth, with supported housing schemes helping to bridge the gap between living completely independently and needing residential or nursing care. Supporting people to age well is an absolute priority for us, and these plans ensure we're helping our residents to make choices to enable them to thrive as they grow older.

### Refugees and Asylum Assistance

Plymouth's long and proud history of accepting and settling refugees and asylum seekers is set to continue with the commissioning of a Resettlement Support Service.

this service will provide help and support with access to housing, improved English language skills, increased self-sufficiency via employment and community integration.

### Tackling anti-social behaviour

Plymouth is celebrating a national campaign to tackle anti-social behaviour (ASB) and keep people in Plymouth safe this week.

Over the course of the week, our Safer Communities Team will be joined by partner agencies including Devon and Cornwall Police and the city's housing associations, in road shows across the city.

Councillor Sally Haydon, Cabinet Member for Community Safety, Libraries, Cemeteries & Crematoria, said: "This week is a really good chance to shine a light on anti-social behaviour its effects on communities and what can be done to reduce it.

"We're lucky to live in a relatively safe city but where there is anti-social behaviour, it's really important that residents don't suffer in silence.

### Freeport

Plymouth City Council is planning two new multi-million pound investments in the Plymouth and South Devon Freeport, members will hear this week as part of the Freeport's annual update.

Plans are being developed for £15.6 million of new investment across two Freeport sites in the Council's ownership.

Councillor Tudor Evans OBE, Leader of Plymouth City Council, said:

"This is an historic opportunity for Plymouth to fully orientate our economy into delivering more skilled jobs and become a core international trading location. It is my priority now to make sure it delivers, driving forward our plans to create at least 3,500 jobs across the city.



### National Marine Park Activities

More amazing activities to get people in, on, under and around Plymouth Sound are in the pipeline as the team behind the park outlines an epic programme of events they want to roll out next year.

The Council's Growth and Infrastructure Scrutiny Committee heard what's been happening as well as a taster for what's to come subject to a successful bid to The National Lottery Heritage Fund.

The programme of work included the activity plan, major improvements to historic features, nature restoration, a digital park and interpretation to enable the new sustainable relationship with the sea. There will be a focus on working alongside communities that currently have little or no engagement with the NMP.

Councillor Tudor Evans OBE said: "Festivals, mass participation events, major opportunities for our young people – we have spent time talking and listening to what people want to see and now we are getting ready for action."

### Plymouth – A co-operative Council

As first council in the country to develop a strategy to grow the co-operative sector, we are now reviewing our innovative approach, doing more to lead the change needed to respond to the cost of living, housing and the environmental crisis.

The council has committed to review existing strategies to develop a water-tight plan to encourage co-operatives to thrive, which was launched on 6 July 2024 on International Co-operative Day.

Councillor Chris Penberthy, Cabinet member for Housing, Co-operative Development and Communities said:

### Active Travel

We have been awarded £1.24 million by Active Travel England to deliver an exciting programme to enable more people to take up walking and cycling for their health and well-being.

The funding is being used to deliver a programme of 'socially prescribed' walking and cycling, where health providers, link workers and service providers work together to help people meet their personal activity needs and goals.

As part of the project link workers within GP practices and health and wellbeing hubs will be able to direct people to a range of exciting walking and cycling activities,

Councillor Mark Coker, Cabinet Member for Transport, said: "Through the project we will be providing an exciting high quality package of walking and cycling initiatives delivered through community engagement which will allow active travel to be part of people's everyday lives directly improving the health and well-being of residents in Plymouth."

### Dental Task Force

The first city-wide task force, set-up to tackle the city's growing dental crisis, hit the ground running with organisations committing to working together to improve NHS capacity.

One of the priorities of the new administration was to set-up a cross-party Dental Task Force, bringing together key stakeholders, local MPs and NHS leaders from across the city to discuss what can be done to improve dental provision in Plymouth.

Councillor Mary Aspinall, Cabinet Member for Health and Adult Social Care at Plymouth City Council, said: "Our poor dental provision is impacting the daily lives of some of our most vulnerable residents." At the meeting, NHS Devon committed to working with the main providers of NHS dental care in Plymouth, to look at whether local underspends in other areas of NHS dental provision could be re-prioritised.

To help residents struggling during the cost of living crisis, Plymouth City Council is sharing details of all the free activities, events and things to do in the city.

This is a key element of the Council's new cost of living action plan, which is set to be launched in August.

Councillor Sue Dann, Cabinet Member for Customer Services, Sport, Leisure and HR and OD, who is leading the creation of the action plan, said: "We have made a commitment to tackling the cost of living crisis, and look forward to launching our new action plan later in the summer

### **Safer Places to Live – A loan to Young Devon**

Some of the city's vulnerable young people will get a safer place to live, thanks to a Council loan.

Council leader Tudor Evans OBE has today approved a business case to lend £210,000 to Young Devon to buy a property which will become home for five young people.

Councillor Evans said: "We're using our borrowing power to help a charity work with some of our vulnerable young people who find themselves without a place to call their own. "We know that good quality and affordable accommodation remains challenging in Plymouth. So imagine how tough it is for young people just starting out in life,"

### **Fixing the Foreshore**

Pebble Beach has now fully reopened to the public.

The popular beach, which sits between the Wet Wok and Maritimo restaurants and is accessed from Hoe Road, has been closed since late May after a survey revealed that the natural rocky outcrop that protrudes from the sea wall was unstable.

Chris Penberthy, Cabinet Member for Housing, Cooperative Development and Communities, said: "I'm really pleased to be able to open Pebble Beach, and in time for the summer holidays as we previously promised. The beach may only be small but we know how popular it is with families, swimmers, stand up paddle boarders, snorkelers... the list goes on!" Cabinet Member for Finance Councillor Mark Lowry said: “The city centre is absolutely critical to the growth and reputation of Plymouth. We are looking at this with a fresh pair of eyes and need to inject pace and enthusiasm into our city centre and to help unblock some of the developments that have stalled or slowed right down.”

### **Independent company to gather views on new Armada Way designs**
