#### 11. Chair's Urgent Business

There was two items of Chairs urgent business:

- The Chair received a letter addressed to the Brexit, Infrastructure and Legislative Change Overview and Scrutiny Committee from Luke Pollard MP which explained his 10 points he would use to vote on the various trade bills going to parliament. The chair will circulate the letter with members of this committee following the meeting.
- 2. The Chair informed the Committee that the Cabinet will be meeting 10 July 2018 to discuss the establishment of Shadow Transport board which is a strategic transport body to talk on behalf of Somerset, Devon, Cornwall, Dorset, Torbay and Plymouth to the government and Highways England about strategic transport plans. This was brought to Cllr Morris attention as

Brexit, Infrastructure and Legislative Change Overview and Scrutiny Committee because it was not included in the forward plan.

#### 12. **Mayflower 400**

Councillor Pete Smith (Deputy Leader of Plymouth City Council) introduced a report on Mayflower 400. David Draffan (Service Director for Economic Development), Amanda Lumley (Chief Executive of Destination Plymouth) and Charles Hackett (Chief Executive Officer of Mayflower 400) were also present to answer questions.

The key areas of questioning from Members related to -

- a) obtaining future funding as 2020 approached;
- b) whether sufficient accommodation was available for visitors;
- c) likely number and economic value of increased visitors;
- d) alignment of grants available to Councillors for community benefit;
- e) overseas funding and support for the project.

Members agreed to -

- Recommend the engagement of communities by the Mayflower 400 team seeking advice and engagement through Councillors, the Council's Community Connections team and other bodies;
- 2. Recommend that the Mayflower 400 team make contact with the administrative support for the Councillors' community grants to ensure opportunities for use of Community Grant Scheme funds in support of Mayflower 400 within the City's wards are highlighted to councillors;
- 3. Support the continuing delivery of the Mayflower 400 programme in Plymouth and nationally;
- 4. Support the required bids into grant funding opportunities to secure additional funding for the overall programme;
- 5. Support the developing national and international relationships up to and beyond 2020 for the long term economic and community benefit of the city.

Authorise orders to be placed with the Statutory Undertakers under the NRSWA process for the design and construction costs for activities required to undertake alterations to utility apparatus and service diversions as a result of the Forder Valley Link Road scheme as set out in the Part 2 Contract Award Report.

#### 5 Reasons for decision:

The decision needs to be taken now to obtain the 18% discount available to Local Authorities under the NRSWA 1991 and to meet the statutory undertakers lead-times.

#### 6 Alternative options considered and rejected:

Not to place the orders now would mean the statutory undertakers would unlikely be available when the main construction starts for the scheme and would require the DfT Business case to be submitted on less advanced information and more uncertainty and risk on the cost plan.

#### 7 Financial implications:

The funding for the scheme has already been approved under Executive Decisions L33 14/15, L24 15/16, L4 17/18 and L52 17/18.

This decision would spend monies allocated to the scheme from the above decisions.

## FORDER VALLEY LINK ROAD

Placement of Orders with Statutory Undertakers -Summary Report



PART I

## I. INTRODUCTION

- 1.1. This report is in relation to the procurement of a contract for the design & construction of the utility works required for the Forder Valley Link Road (FVLR). The works involve the design and construction of service diversions requiring civil engineering activates. Payments for works are required to be made to:
  - Western Power Distribution (WPD)
     Virgin Media (VM)
  - Wales & West Utilities (WWU)
     BT Open Reach (BT)
  - South West Water (SWW)

#### 2. BACKGROUND

- 2.1. The Forder Valley Link Road (FVLR) is a new one-kilometre road linking Forder Valley Road and Novorossiysk Road to William Prance Road in Derriford. The scheme will provide a direct route to Derriford from the east for all traffic, including future Park and Ride services that will operate between the proposed Deep Lane Park and Ride (Sherford) and Derriford.
- 2.2. The scheme will directly unlock development at Seaton Neighbourhood, and support further development in the north of the city of 4,300 new homes and 9,000 new jobs. This scheme supports economic prosperity of the City, leading to wider economic benefits.
- 2.3. The key objectives of the scheme are:
  - To reduce congestion by providing additional network capacity for all users, thereby improving journey times on the A386 corridor and improving access to Derriford from the east;
  - To support economic development by providing transport infrastructure to support the planned growth in the Derriford and Seaton area;
  - To promote public transport use by improving bus connectivity from the east;
  - To encourage use of sustainable travel modes by providing an off-highway cycling and pedestrian link between Forder Valley Roundabout and Derriford, through to Derriford Community Park and Glacis Park on the west side of the A386.
- 2.4. The main construction of the scheme is anticipated to start in the late summer of 2018 and is expected to be completed by the autumn / winter of 2020.

### 3. **PROCUREMENT PROCESS**

- 3.1. The procurement of works required to be undertaken by Utility companies is undertaken through the 'New Roads and Street Works Act 1991', NRSWA process.
- 3.2. As the works involved are with Statutory undertakers, it is only the Utility companies themselves that can operate on or divert their own utility apparatus. Therefore, no alternative suppliers are permitted to work on Statutory Undertakers apparatus and only the utility companies themselves have the knowledge to plan, design and advise what diversion works and alterations are required to their apparatus

#### 4. FINANCIAL IMPLICATIONS

- 4.1. This report is for the Utility design and construction activities required to undertake alterations to utility apparatus as a result of the FVLR scheme.
- 4.2. Payments need to be made now in order to obtain the 18% discount available to Local Authorities under the NRSWA 1991. This requires 75% of the total estimated works at the C4 stage of the NRSWA process (detailed design of the scheme) is required to be paid in advance of the detailed design and construction of the utility works with the remaining 25% plus or minus any changes in the final cost following completion of the works.
- 4.3. A C4 estimate has been provided by each of the Utility companies however it is important to note that this estimate may be revised as the design and construction progresses.
- 4.4. The funding for this award has already been accounted for through the business case and <u>Executive Decision L52 17/18</u> in March 2018 which allocated £4.47m of Highways England Growth and Housing Funding to the scheme within the Capital Programme.
- 4.5. There are therefore no new financial implications resulting from this contract award.

#### 5. **RECOMMENDATIONS**

5.1. It is recommended that a payments be made to the 5 statutory undertakers for the design and construction of alterations and diversions of utility apparatus as a result of the Forder Valley Link Road scheme

#### Sustainable Communities Act 2007: A Proposal relating to the impacts on communities of the withdrawal of the UK from the European Union

This is a Proposal made by Plymouth City Council in response to your invitation under section 5A(b) (subsequent invitations) of the above Act. Whilst this proposal relates to the area of Plymouth, I am aware of similar proposals from other local authorities.

#### The Proposal

Immediate receipt by Plymouth City Council of all government departmental information and analysis pertaining to the impacts upon Plymouth's communities and businesses of the UK's withdrawal from the European Union, including any information deemed by the government to be confidential.

#### Rationale for the proposal

The Council has identified a number of risks to the economic and social wellbeing of its communities as a result of the European Union (Withdrawal) Act 2018. In order to properly mitigate these risks, the Council seeks to obtain sufficient information to inform its engagement with businesses, institutions and communities, decision-making and resource allocation. The issues identified where the Council is seeking further information pertaining to Plymouth include, but are not limited to:

- The detail of EU powers affecting local government that will be incorporated into domestic • law, and the extent to which devolution of such powers to local authorities is planned.
- The likely impacts on the supply of EU migrant labour based on all the likely withdrawal scenarios, given the city's significant reliance on EU migrant labour in the academic, advanced engineering, manufacturing, construction, tourism and care sectors, and concerns about the future of circa 18,000 citizens of the city born outside the UK.
- Likely impacts on foreign direct investment, given half of the city's twenty largest companies are foreign owned and half of these are located here specifically to access EU markets



- Domestic and international connectivity, specifically the risks posed by new customs requirements to existing routes for goods including agricultural and fishing produce and the timeliness of any transitional arrangements.
- Loss of direct EU financial support, including plans for the continuing support of ERDF, ESIF and EMFF funded projects after 2020.
- Impact on the Higher Education Sector, including the reduction of EU student numbers, classification of international students and impacts on the supply of EU based academic professionals.
- Likely impacts on social cohesion under different withdrawal scenarios and plans to mitigate these.

#### Consultation

In May 2018, Plymouth City Council put in place the Brexit, Infrastructure and Legislative Change Overview and Scrutiny Committee with a specific remit to:

- Review the impact of Brexit on the city of Plymouth
- Propose measures that Government should take to provide stability for the council and partners in light of Brexit
- Explore powers that could be devolved from the EU directly to local authorities

The above Committee is the vehicle by which the Council has, and continues to engage over this proposal with persons who in the opinion of the authority are representatives of interested local persons in the interpretation of the Sustainable Communities Regulations 2012 (the Regulations). These persons include representatives of the manufacturing, Higher Education, technology, engineering, catering, fisheries and tourism sectors, as well as Plymouth's diverse communities.

#### Next Steps

I look forward to the publication of your decision and reasons in relation to this proposal as set out in the Regulations. In light of the significant issues set out above, and the potential for significant impacts on our city, its businesses and citizens, I'm sure that you'll agree the importance of an early response.
