	Fishing and the Marine Environment are vitally important to the City of Plymouth and its economy.		
	To specifically support our local fishing community and to protect our internationally important marine environment we call on the Leader of Plymouth City Council:

Tampon Tax Amended to - Council joins with the Chancellor in congratulating Paula Sherriff, the former Labour MP for Dewsbury, in her campaign to abolish the Tampon Tax. Further the Council welcomes the change in government policy which now means that VAT on women's sanitary products has been removed from 1st January 2021. Council welcomes the work that Red Box and Trevi House have done in Plymouth over a number of years to raise concerns about the Tampon Tax and in the practical steps they have taken to mitigate its impact on local women. It further welcomes the leadership taken by the Council's current Labour administration over the past two years in raising these issues and thanks Lindsey Hall for the support she is giving in working with schools to raise awareness of period poverty. switched to online learning and due to travel restrictions barring travel to Plymouth.	
The council further notes that these restrictions, as part of a national lockdown, are necessary to slow the spread of coronavirus and protect the capacity of the NHS.	
Noting that students, like many other people, have suffered profound economic consequences due to the necessity of these public restrictions, the Council will ask the Cabinet member for Education, Skills and Transformation to write to the UK Government, asking relevant departments to work with student landlords, both university-owned and private, to:	
 reduce student rent by forty percent for the rest of the academic year, 	
 enable students who cannot occupy their accommodation to exit their contracts without penalty, 	
 reimburse students who have paid in advance and cannot occupy their accommodation, 	
 reimburse lost income for student landlords whose tenants cannot occupy their accommodation 	
 consider allowing students who cannot work due to lockdown to claim Universal Credit 	COMPLETE
 respond to the Higher Education sector's request for government financial support for enhanced student hardship funds allowing students to receive direct financial support across the full range of financial hardships caused by the pandemic

Dear Chancellor

As the Leader of Plymouth City Council, I very much welcome your decision to follow through with your commitment made in your March 2020 Budget announcement, to remove VAT on sanitary products from I January 2021. I would also pay tribute to the massive work undertaken by people like Paula Sherriff, the former Labour MP for Dewsbury, and her many colleagues who campaigned tirelessly for years to raise the profile of this matter, and to end this unjust tax.

The Council's current administration has also been particularly active over the past two years in raising the issues created by the Tampon Tax, and is grateful to partners like Lindsey Hall at RIO for the support she is providing through her work with schools in the city to raise awareness of period poverty. In addition, the work Plymouth City Council has done with local organisations like Red Box and Trevi House that have put in place practical steps to mitigate the impact of period poverty for local women.

However, we recognise there is more to do. I am asking you as Chancellor to support further action that will tackle period poverty. Specifically that you will:

- make it clear that manufacturers and retailers should match this commitment (removing VAT) by providing a price reduction for the public; and that you
- maintain the current ring-fenced funding for projects that help disadvantaged and vulnerable women across the UK.

In doing so we can build a fairer society, where women and girls feel valued and supported, and where they have access to essential, affordable, tax-free sanitary products.

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Open letter to Universities and Purpose Built Student Accommodation Providers (PBSAs)

16 February 2021

To Whom It May Concern:

We are writing to you about the uncertain financial pressures students are currently facing.

We recognise these are challenging times and how vital it is, more than ever, that we act to ensure the safety of everyone. Covid-19 has had a significant impact on so many lives across the UK, through damage to health, changes to life circumstances or financial difficulty. It has also had a devastating impact on the wider economy with many businesses closed or financially struggling. Which in turn has had an impact on student's ability to secure part-time and holiday work and many now face financial hardship.

With all this in mind, in order to protect our students during the pandemic we have a number of voluntary asks:

- Requesting that all Universities and PBSAs stay updated with implemented best practice public health guidance, communicate with tenants and provide the maximum support possible.
- Accommodation providers end all evictions, for all renters, for the duration of the crisis, and particularly for those who do not have another home. To prevent them from being made homeless in the cases where agreements continues past tenancy dates.
- Suspend all rent increases.
- Enable students who cannot occupy their accommodation to exit their contracts without penalty,

We realise this is a large financial ask, and this has had far reaching consequences for everyone. However, we are asking for your understanding and leniency towards students who may be struggling financially, or who cannot access their accommodation due to lockdown legislation. By showing flexibility in their accommodation contracts.

We are aware that many of you have already taken steps to provide support and we wanted to share with you steps we have already taken in Plymouth.

- Plymouth Marjon University has waived rent for students that have been unable to travel to the university due to lockdown.
- University of Plymouth has taken similar action through its enhanced student hardship fund.



We know that many universities and PBSAs across the UK are also introducing measures and we hope that we can all adopt similar measures to support all students.
