5	Reasons for decision: The business case covers decarbonising the heating systems at 7 PCC sites, including improving glazing, insulation and installing solar PV & Battery. The main benefit is reducing associated carbon emissions. Lowering carbon emissions will contribute to the declaration of a climate emergency, the pledge to be carbon neutral by 2030 and is part of the Corporate Carbon Reduction Plan. Nearly 3,400 tonnes of CO ₂ e will be reduced over the life of the measures.						
	This project helps deliver JLP DEV32 – Delivering low carbon development by reducing the heating energy load and JLP DEV33 – Renewable and low carbon energy by the installation of heat pumps and solar PV.						
	It also helps to deliver the promise of a "Green, sustainable city that cares about the environment" through delivering low energy heating to reduce carbon emissions and pollution.						
6	Alternative options considered and rejected:						
	Alternative technologies such as ground source open loop heat pumps were investigated but well-testing proved that it was not feasible for this part of the heat network, so air source heat pumps were chosen.						
	Option I: Do Nothing – no capital spending or revenue pressure but PCC fails reduce its carbon emissions and loses out on government grant money (would need to be paid back).						
	Option 2 : Do Minimum Option - only do buildings with energy savings (Council and Midland) but less carbon savings than the full project, challenging the net-zero by 2030 pledge, and losing out on a significant portion of grant money which would need to be topped up by PCC.

For Economic Development (Crownhill Court) there is a revenue pressure of £18,775 in year I increasing to £17,996 in year 20. For the Corporate Landlord there is a revenue saving of £5,056 for measures in Midland and Council House, but a revenue cost for Derriford Business Park, Camel's Head, Frederick Str and Prince Rock Admin building of £26,549 in year I, which reduces to £25,512 in year 20.

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NEXT 7 DECARBONISATION PROJECT

Briefing Report Part I



Following feasibility work for heat decarbonisation of seven PCC sites, the business case has been approved (24/03/2021). This heat and building fabric project will reduce nearly 3,400t of carbon emissions over the life of the measures (heat pumps, PV, glazing and insulation).

The project is expected to cost about £1,672,900.

A capital grant cover 96% of the project costs has been approved. The rest of the costs are covered by \$106 money.

The project covers seven sites with a range of heat decarbonisation measures:

- I Derriford Park: high temperature air source heat pump (HT ASHP)
- Camels Head: HT ASHP, PV and battery
- Prince Rock Admin: HT ASHP, PV and battery, external wall insulation
- Frederick Str: HT ASHP, loft insulation
- Crownhill Court: HT ASHP, PV and battery
- Council House: loft insulation
- Midland House: external roof insulation, double glazing window replacement

This project supports the need to reduce carbon emissions across the PCC estate. This contributes to the Corporate Carbon Reduction Plan, and the Climate Emergency Action Plan.

The project will deliver 4 cross-border work packages aimed at supporting individuals at risk of exclusion and businesses at risk of closure in order to reverse some of the negative impacts of the pandemic.

This focus on several interrelated topic areas and the associated activities will play a key role in reducing business closures, reducing the risk of individuals becoming socially and economically excluded and ensuring a sustainable recovery across the FCE area.

6 Alternative options considered and rejected:

(I) Do Nothing

The sudden impact of Covid 19 meant that authorities first had to react and respond. There has been little time as yet to reflect on the effectiveness of this response on a local, regional or national basis let alone to look beyond national boundaries.

Doing nothing and failing to consider looking at Cross-border solutions we will lose the opportunity to examine different responses in different national, regional and local contexts and learn the lessons and best practice from what is being done in a range of locations. There would be no added value to own

	Covid recovery programmes without that cross border partner working to ensure maximum benefit from best practice.

INTERREG (FCE) PROGRAMME

Acceptance of funding offer from the Interreg (France Channel England -FCE) 2014-2020 programme

Part I Briefing Report



1.0 SCHEME SUMMARY

PCC has secured funding from the Interreg (France Channel England - FCE) 2014 -2020 programme to support innovation in order to address the economic and societal issues facing the FCE area.

The project title is Covid Channel Area Response Exchange (C-Care) and seeks to increase the quality and effectiveness of service delivery to the most socially and economically disadvantaged groups through social innovation Covid Channel Area Response Exchange.

The overall programme runs from 1 August 2020 to 30 June 2023. This particular project will commence on 1 April 2021.

C-Care is a ground-breaking partnership of 4 English & 3 French organisations along with a much wider network of stakeholders and previous Interreg projects from the FCE area who have developed a unique and ambitious package of targeted support in response to some of the socio-economic impacts of the Covid-19 Pandemic.

Covid-19 has affected every area of life in the FCE area and the C-Care capitalisation project aims to address issues where the impacts have been the greatest.

The project will deliver 4 cross-border work packages aimed at supporting individuals at risk of exclusion and businesses at risk of closure in order to reverse some of the negative impacts of the pandemic.

- Work Package I (WPI) a reflection on the last year Respond, Reflect, Report will enable partners, stakeholders and other FCE projects to review initial Covid-response, gather good practice and bring together lessons learnt in order to shape a new package of Covid-19 response and recovery actions
- Work Package 2 (WP2) Individuals (further) disadvantaged by the pandemic C-Care Support for Social Inclusion will deliver targeted support to more than 4547 individuals to develop new skills and tools to help them into employment or start a business
- Work Package 3 (WP3) Business adaptation and Resilience C-Care Support for Business Recovery will provide direct support to over 1,947 businesses via advice, vouchers and grants aimed at helping sectors hard-hit by the pandemic to develop new business models to respond market changes and ensure a green, inclusive and sustainable economic recovery.
- Work Package 4 (WP4) Future models of working C-CARE Reset and Redesign will develop blueprints for future town centres to improve long term prospects for businesses and work on new ways to tackle social exclusion and in particular digital and food poverty.

2.0 BUDGET SUMMARY AND BUSINESS CASE

The grant of 1,127,995.47 Euros apportioned to Plymouth City Council as Project Partner will address the following categories of spend and lead on the following delivery projects and will involve the appointment of 5 new staff for the duration of the programme:

WP2 Future Work Skills – community outreach to the Skills Launchpad

This strand links to our work with businesses to engage individuals who have been disproportionately affected by pandemic. It tackles a need identified to enable community outreach services to engage

and refer individuals to develop skills action plans that will equip them for future work opportunities in the city. As we emerge from the pandemic, face-to-face contact through safe trusted contacts will be vital to begin to tackle the barriers of isolation and lack of confidence that many face. The project will engage 500 individuals via 20 outreach services and provide them with skills action plans that are aligned to Labour Market Information and work in new ways.

- Community outreach to engage people disadvantaged by the pandemic
- 500 skills action plans
- Promotion aligned to labour market information
- WP3 Sustainable Business Recovery implementing the Charter

This strand implements a programme for inclusive economic growth. It is designed to build on the lessons of the emergency to enable businesses and organisations to understand and implement new practices that make the city's whole economy more resilient in the increasingly complex economic environment. It will provide businesses with new learning tools to understand how their business environment is changing and how they can adapt to new ways of working. Learning from WPI will be used to pilot 5 new business support programmes in: supply chains; skills/ workforce engagement, employment practices, high street renaissance and climate emergency. These pilots will then be rolled out to wider audiences. We will work with 50 businesses on the pilots and roll out to a further 150 businesses. PP2 will also engage in this strand, bringing in expertise from related programmes, and helping develop and evaluate activities.

- Understanding our increasingly complex business environment and planning for environmental action
- WP4 Future Blueprint for Cities (procured)

This activity strand, will create a blueprint for city centres and suburban high streets. These are experiencing a significant shift away from high street retail, with closed shops unlikely to be re-let, and changes in the premises and locations businesses need as they change the way they work. Delivery will be procured for specialist cultural knowledge and expertise using a co-created brief from the earlier deliverable. It will investigate the culture of the high street and opportunities to use vacant shops to provide new services and in new ways – both online and face-to-face – that provide inclusive jobs and enable people to live healthy and productive lives. Pilot investments will enable start-up businesses, interest groups or collaborations to take over empty shops and public spaces with new uses (not otherwise present in the area), along with co-ordination resources such as a web-portal, to demonstrate how the change can be implemented. The output for the project will be a Blueprint for City Centres and High Streets with 15 case studies showing practical delivery.

3.0 REVENUE IMPLICATIONS

 \pounds 974,506 (1,127,995 Euros) of ring-fenced revenue grant has been awarded to PCC to meet 100% of the cost of achieving the revenue grant objectives. Effective project management will ensure that the project is delivered within the grant terms and conditions. There are no expected revenue pressures arising as a result of accepting this grant award.
