Plymouth currently has 5,375 disabled passholders in addition to the elderly passholders detailed above. This will include conditions which can result in people being unable to drive. They are therefore reliant upon public transport to access their place of work, employment or education opportunities, health and related services, or to go shopping. The bus shelter contract will ensure shelters meet accessibility requirements so that the needs of those with disabilities are catered for.
