Purpose of Report

The administration continues with its four year programme to deliver against the 100 pledges, by March 22, for a better, greener and fairer Plymouth. Following the completion of 8 pledges in February, the total number of pledges completed is 71 of the 100.

A "pledge on a page" overview has been prepared for each of the following pledges listed below:

- Pledge 9: Many local businesses work hard for the good of Plymouth, going the extra mile to help meet the city's needs and working for inclusive growth. We will explore ways in which we can help businesses and social enterprises that go further than a standard corporate social responsibility programme to grow.
- Pledge 15: Electric cars are increasingly popular. We will install more electric car charging points in Plymouth, including in residential areas.
- Pledge 31: We will prioritise stopping as many people as possible becoming homeless, and we will end the practice of families with children being housed in Bed and Breakfasts. -PRIORITY PLEDGE (TOP 5)
- Pledge 33: The vast majority of landlords in Plymouth are good and take care of their properties, but there are far too many poor-quality homes. We will toughen up enforcement of housing in the private rented sector to drive up standards for renters. If, within 12 months, the private rented sector has not taken substantial steps to improve standards, we will begin the process of introducing a licensing scheme for the private rented sector.
- Pledge 42: We think the current system of fining parents for taking their children on holiday in term time can hurt families on a budget. We will work with schools and parents to introduce a fair system so families can take an annual holiday without penalty. -PRIORITY PLEDGE (TOP 5)
- Pledge 86: We will deliver the upgrade of Central Park, ensuring it remains the city's green lung and a community asset we can all be proud of. We will not allow house-building on parkland to protect Central Park. The new park at Seaton will be as important to the north of Plymouth as Central Park is to the south of the city. This new park will open in the next few years and we will ensure it delivers for local people.
- Pledge 90: We will review the current policy of charging for bulky waste collections and re-introduce community skips where practical. We will increase the use of community bins to cut down the number of wheelie bins in some residential streets.

 Pledge 91: We will trial all-electric road sweepers, which can reduce both air pollution and operating costs. - PRIORITY PLEDGE (TOP 5)
