CEAP 2021 Outturn Report 23 February 2022



I. INTRODUCTION

1.1. This report sets out the outturn position in relation to the actions set out in the Climate Emergency Action Plan 2021 (CEAP2) agreed by the City Council at its meeting on 25 January 2021. It highlights the completion of the majority of actions, describing some of the key achievements over the last year.

CEAP 2021 OUTTURN

1.2. At year end, 78% of all actions have been 'achieved' and 22% 'achieved in part'. Many of the actions reported as 'achieved in part' experienced slippages owing in part to the effects of the COVID-19 pandemic. Narratives are provided for each action to provide evidence of progress. There are no actions that have 'not been achieved'.

2. KEY ACHIEVEMENTS

- 2.1. Some highlights from CEAP2 actions achieved include:
 - There was continued delivery of the £105.6 Million Transforming Cities Fund programme of sustainable transport projects, including completing the tender process for the flagship Mobility Hubs project (Action 2.38).
 - In addition to the original sum of £250,000 has been ring fenced in Plan for Homes 3 specifically to support delivery of an Eco Homes Programme to deliver low and zero carbon housing this was increased to £1.5 Million during the year (Action 2.8). The development of a low carbon housing schemes at Kings Tamerton and Broadland Gardens are two of the flagship projects within this programme (Action 2.4).
 - Several new walking and cycling schemes were completed across the city (Actions 2.22 to 2.25) and an ambitious new Local Walking and Cycling Plan for future investments was approved (Action 2.15).
 - As at December 2021,185 charging points have been installed and are operational.
 - The Inclusive Growth Group of the Plymouth Growth Board published the 'Resurgam Charter', and delivered on its commitment to encourage and support businesses to respond proactively to the Climate Emergency Action led to the implementation of initiatives to support businesses with the transition to net zero which will be delivered in 2022 (Action 2.78)

A number of departments of the City Council worked proactively with partners and residents to offer meaningful engagement activities during 2021, despite the restrictions of the COVID-19 pandemic. These included:

- Holding the second Climate Challenge event on 08 November 2021 which awarded £50,000 of prize money to support community-led climate projects. This seed funding for 3 innovative projects was distributed through our award-winning City Change Fund Crowdfunder platform (Action 2.69)
- Holding the Abercrombie Awards on 18 November 2021 which introduced a new 'Best response to the climate emergency' award, seeking to recognise an innovative project that could demonstrate significant carbon reductions or which inspired others to act in fighting climate change. The award was won by 'Future Plymouth 2030': a series of webinars organized in partnership with the University of Plymouth and the Royal Institute of British Architects to raise awareness of low carbon construction (Action 2.11).
- The City Council delivering the Green Minds and the Preventing Plastic Pollution projects, which both intend to promote greater awareness and connection with the natural world (Action 2.66 and Action 2.67).
- Achieving Action 2.62 to: 'Engage with the Youth Parliament to ensure that the voice of children and young people is heard in relation to the Climate Emergency'. This culminated in the delivery of a Climate Emergency Summit for Young People (Action 2.63), which was held on 29 October 2021. Entirely designed by the young people, the event led to the creation of a series of recommendations to the City Council on the Climate Emergency and to the appointment of the first Climate Change Ambassador for the city.
- Plymouth Libraries held the 'In it Together' event on Saturday 09 October 2021 at Central Library (Action 2.64) which gave families an opportunity to explore ways to protect our environment and learn about Climate Change.

3. CONCLUSION

- 3.1. CEAP 2 actions were designed to build on the momentum created since the declaration of Climate Emergency in March 2019 and the implementation of the emergency phase of the Council's Climate Emergency Response. The CEAP 2 actions continue to contribute towards achieving our commitment to net zero by 2030.
- 3.2. Although the Climate Emergency Action Plan 2021 has placed greater emphasis on engagement in 2021 it is intended that a further programme of engagement activities are developed in 2022.
- 3.3. The actions set out in CEAP3, which were agreed by the City Council on 24 January 2022, will begin the process of accelerating further reductions in carbon emissions, progress on which will also be reported to the Brexit, Infrastructure and Legislative Change Overview and Scrutiny Committee during 2022.
