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1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 On the 4th March 2022 the licensing department received an application from Jalil Amin for the Grant of a Premises Licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of Stoke Grill, 62 Devonport Road, Plymouth.

1.2 Grant application.

The premises are operating as a food take away shop.

1.3 Licensable Activities.

The following licensable activities and timings have been requested:

(i) <u>Late Night Refreshment (Indoors and Outdoors)</u> Monday - Sunday 23:00hrs to 02:00hrs

(I) Hours Premises are Open to the Public

Monday – Sunday 15:00hrs to 02:00hrs

- 1.4 The applicant has submitted an Operating Schedule (Appendix 1).
- 1.5 Site location of premises (Appendix 2).
- 1.6 Plan of premises (Appendix 3)
- 1.7 Four representations have been received in respect of this application.

1.8 Cumulative Impact Policy

4.0 CONSIDERATIONS

- the Council's own Licensing Policy with the following headed paragraphs being relevant to this application: Dispersal Policy (Page 12); Licensing Hours (Page 12), Late Night refreshment (Page 13), Healthier Food Provision (Page 13), Public Nuisance (Page 19), Licensing conditions (page 22), Cumulative impact assessment (page 27, 28, 33 34, 37)
- the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties.

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The Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

- I. Grant the licence as asked.
- 2. Modify the conditions of the licence, by altering or omitting or adding to them.
- 3. Reject the whole or part of the application.
- 4. It may also refuse to specify a designated premises supervisor and/or only allow certain requested licensable activities.

The Committee is asked to note that it may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must actually be appropriate in order to promote the licensing objectives.

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Appendix I

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Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

a) General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d and e) (please read guidance note 10)

The Licensee, that is the person in whose name the premises licence is issued, shall ensure that all times when the premises are for any licensable activity, there are sufficient competent staff on duty at the premises for the purpose of fulfilling the terms and conditions of the licence and for preventing crime and disorder. The Licensee shall ensure that staff will undertake training in their responsibilities. Records will be kept of training and refresher training.

b) The prevention of crime and disorder

Any incidents of a criminal nature that may occur on the premises will be reported to the Police. The Licensee will install comprehensive CCTV coverage at the premises and it is operated and maintained at the premises

c) Public safety

Appropriate fire safety procedures are in place including fire extinguishers (foam, H20 and CO2), fire blanket, internally illuminated fire exit signs, numerous smoke detectors and emergency lighting (see enclosed plan for details of locations). All appliances are inspected annually. All emergency exits shall be kept free from obstruction at all times


d) The prevention of public nuisance


All customers will be asked to leave quietly. Clear and legible notices will be prominently displayed to remind customers to leave quietly and have regard to our neighbours

e) The protection of children from harm

All staff will be trained for UNDERAGE SALES PREVENTION regularly. A register of refused sales shall be kept and maintained on the premises.

I am writing as advised regarding the above premises requesting an extension to their opening hours from 23.00 to 02.00hrs.

I implore you to **not** permit this to be granted. As a resident in the village, for some 25yrs, having to live around these takeaway establishments is like living on a rubbish tip and it is only getting worst. The owners of the takeaways take no responsibility of the rubbish their business creates. With the cut backs of the street cleaners Stoke looks neglected and disgusting. The filth is abhorrent, the smell awful, attracting the seagulls and rats.

Every morning, but more at the weekends it is shameful of the amount of takeaway paper and trays discarded on the street. During the weekends and when anyone of the pubs have an event, which is frequent. Vomit from the takeaways on the street and in our doorways, is a regular occurrence.

We have a major problem with parking, and the problems enhanced for the 15 - 20mins to pickup and collect the takeaways for this to be extended to the early hours should be a major negative consideration. The car doors slamming from the takeaway drivers throughout the night is bad but to think this could go on to the early hours of the morning doesn't bare thinking about. The takeaway drivers permanently block a service lane every night, it's the only access we have for my disabled husband to access our home. We have been prepared to work with them during the evening but having this inconvenience until 2am is ridiculous I fear the chaos should we need an ambulance. Because it isn't just one care there can be anything up to 6 cars in the service lane blocking everyone's access. The drivers are usually shouting on their phones in the lane, while waiting for their next delivery. They have no regard to the fact they are in a residential area, with old, mentally handicapped people and shift workers.

Stoke is not only, the main through road for our visitors from the ferries or trains but it is a conservation area which seems to be lost with the planning consents of recent times. 23.00 is an acceptable trading time in a major built up area of residents trying to have a quiet enjoyment of their lives and home. Stoke is not the place for businesses open until 02.00!

I am begging you to listen to and consider the residents and the area this takeaway is based. A 02.00 time might be fine for city centre trading hours but not in this conservation area. The second you approve this one, you will have at least 3 more requesting the same. The planning office needs to consider the quality of life for the residents while making these decisions, I implore you make the

right decision this time. And uphold the decision the planning office made when it was granted change of use from a butchers to a takeaway please.

Good evening,

We are writing to formally object to the proposed extension of opening hours for the Stoke Grill, 62 Devonport Road.

Our objection is based on the following concerns:

- the increase of anti social noise and behaviour in a heavily residential area.
- the increase in waste and litter in an area that already has a huge problem of overflowing bins spilling on to the pavements and commercial packaging being fly tipped.
- the increase of noise and disruption caused by delivery drivers using lanes between residential properties and reversing and driving the wrong way at excessive speed down the one-way street (Wesley Place and Masterman Road)
- the continuation of operational noises (pans clanging, bins being emptied, rear door being opened and closed etc) will be disruptive to nearby residents should they be allowed to continue at such unsociable hours.

The proposed opening until 2am, 7 days a week will have a significant detrimental impact on the lives of nearby residents.
