4a	Decision to be taken: To appoint Kier Construction Ltd via the Pre-Construction Services Agreement to provide a fourth phase of Enabling Works to the new Plymouth Crematorium and also for the procurement of long lead in items ahead of a formal Main Contractor Award, which expected imminently. The amount is £544,619.00 plus vat

	Executive Decision made by a Cabinet Member Reference Number L10 18/19
5	Reasons for decision:
	It is anticipated that the formal Main Contractor Award will be imminent. With costs increasing rapidly, savings have been identified by committing to certain expenditure ahead of the likely timescale for the contract award. This will also mitigate against delays.
	This sum (£544,619.00 plus vat) will cover the costs of; will maintain momentum of supply chain procurement to mitigate exposure to market price inflation and also delay & disruption to the activity programme applicable to the main contract scope of work. This covers the requirement for:-
	Specialist sub-contractor design work required for key subcontract packages
	Extended PCSA design orders previously instructed
	Extended Steelwork order to maintain manufacture and installation
	Order commitments to long lead in items such as cladding and windows
	Order for long lead high risk mechanical equipment
	Planned main contractors welfare establishment
	This will maintain momentum of supply chain procurement to mitigate exposure to market price inflation and also delay & disruption to the activity programme applicable to the main contract scope of work.
6	Alternative options considered and rejected: The alternative option to this is to do nothing until

formal contract award. Kiers would therefore decant from site and potentially have to move key

personnel onto other jobs, and would delay the site being prepared for main contractors welfare needs etc. The delay to ordering items which have long lead times would also lead to delays which could be considerable. The end result would be a new crematorium being delivered much later and increased costs.

7 Financial implications and risks:

This approval is for £544,619.00 plus vat. Costs related to this are to be met from the approved budget for the new Crematorium facility as detailed on the Capital Programme, this work has been budgeted for and is included in that budget. A detailed breakdown of the cost is provided in the supplementary documentation.
