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#### 1.0 INTRODUCTION

1.1 On the 11/11/2022 the licensing department received an application from One Stop Stores Limited, for the Grant of a Premises Licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of One Stop, situated at Cargo2, 41 Millbay Road, Plymouth.

- the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties.

The Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

- 1. Grant the licence as applied for subject to:
  - a. The conditions consistent with the operating schedule (modified\* as considered appropriate for the promotion of the Licensing Objectives),
  - b. The mandatory conditions under sections 19, 20 and 21 of the Act, and
  - c. Any other conditions considered appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives
  - \* modified includes altering, omitting or adding to them
- 2. Grant the licence as above but exclude any of the licensable activities detailed on the application from the licence
- 3. Refuse to specify a designated premises supervisor
- 4. Reject the application

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

b) The prevention of crime and disorder
The premises shall install and maintain a comprehensive CCTV system. All entry and exit points will be covered enabling frontal identification of every person entering in any light condition. The CCTV system shall continually record whilst the premises is open for licensable activities and during all times when customers remain on the premises. All recordings shall be stored for a minimum period of 28 days with date and time stamping.
A staff member from the premises who is able to operate the CCTV system shall be on the premises at all times when the premises are open to the public. This staff member will be able to show the police or other authorised officer data or footage within the minimum of delay when requested to do so.
A refusals log will be maintained in accordance with company policy and made available for inspection at the premises by the police or an authorised officer at all times whilst the premises is open. The refusals log will record the date and time of challenged and refused sales, the identity of the member of staff refusing the sale and details of the alcohol the customer attempted to purchase.
c) Public safety
d) The prevention of public nuisance
e) The protection of children from harm
All staff will be trained to ask any customer attempting to purchase alcohol, who appears to be under the age of 25 years (or older if the licence holder so elects) for evidence of age (Challenge 25). This evidence shall be photographic, such as passport or photographic driving licence, or other form of identification bearing the customer's photograph, date of birth and the Proof of Age Standards Scheme (or similarly accredited scheme) hologram, until other effective identification technology (for example, thumb print or pupil recognition) is introduced. All staff will be instructed, through training, that a sale shall not be made unless this evidence is produced.
Till prompts will be installed to remind staff to check the age of customers for sales of age-restricted products.

List of suggested licensing conditions:-

- I. All staff shall be suitably trained in the operating procedures for refusing service to any person who is drunk or is under-age or appears to be under-age.
- 2. Spirits and all alcoholic beverages on display will be in such a position so as not to be obscured from the constant view of the cashier / staff. (If this is not reasonably practical the Licensing Authority shall be consulted regarding other suitable locations in the premises).
- 3. The Premises Licence Holder will ensure that a CCTV system is fully compliant with the guidance contained in the Information Commissioner's Office (ICO) guidance document (www.informationcommissioner.gov.uk) regarding installation of CCTV is provided at the premises.
- 4. The CCTV system shall cover all areas of the premises to which the public have access including any outside areas.
- 5. Images shall be retained for a minimum of 31 days
- 6. The CCTV system shall be capable of downloading images to a recognizable viewable format.
- 7. At all times the premises are open for business a member of staff shall be present who is capable of operating the CCTV system and downloading images at the request of police or other authorised office
- 8. Minimum of two staff to be on duty at times the premises remain open for sale
- 9. No single cans or bottles of beer or cider will be sold
- 10. No sale of high strength beers or ciders above 6.5 ABV
- I. The Premises Licence Holder or nominated person shall ensure that a clearly visible notice is displayed advising those purchasing off sales information of the city Public Space Protection Order.

### Protection of Children:-

- 12. The Premises Licence Holder or Designated Premises Supervisor shall ensure that all staff, supervisors and managers are trained in the legality and procedure of alcohol sales, using the SWERCOTS on-line training pack or equivalent, prior to undertaking the sale of alcohol and then twice annually. Electronic training records shall be made available to an enforcement officer on request. Historical training records extending back to a period of three years, should be made available within 48 hours.
- 13. The Premises Licence Holder or Designated Premises Supervisor shall ensure a sales refusal register is maintained to include details of all alcohol sales refused and the reason for refusal. The refusals register should be made available to an authorized enforcement officer on request.

Additionally the area is already well known with individuals struggling with addictions of various sorts-I feel this would invite some of these people to the very grounds of a school that supports some of the

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				most vulnerable children from the most deprived areas of the city. The street drinking at the moment is somewhat removed from the school area, however this new shop selling alcohol would bring this to the school doorstep. Please note I am more than happy to speak with whoever is concerned or attend any meetings that may occur on the back of this rejection.

As an Academy we already face significant challenges within the immediate area around us including: drug use, a local drug and alcohol shelter, a homeless shelter that helps adults with challenges and health issues, restorative justice, and at times sex workers at the rear of the building. We also are within walking distance of the local pupil referral unit (ACE), with students that, at times can cause challenges by arriving outside of the school perimeter.

The introduction of a shop selling alcohol etc, would likely draw the aforementioned groups to congregate even nearer to the school creating a greater risk to our pupils (with potential increase in crime and disorder around the Academy). There are other stores in the vicinity which sell alcohol etc, so an additional alcohol retailer so close to the school is unnecessary especially given the increased risk to children as a result.

There are numerous examples of anti-social behaviours outside of stores such as these and believe that the risk to many of our vulnerable young children would be significant.

### The prevention of public nuisance

For example noise disturbance, littering.

Alongside the Academy, we regularly experience anti-social behaviour around the perimeter of the site. This has included members of public and the shelters being intoxicated, shouting, fighting, urinating, exposing themelves and leaving broken bottles alongside needles etc. The introduction of the One Stop shop we believe will be extremely detrimental to our most vulnerable students and could even see some encouraged into unsafe behaviours. There will be increased litter and the disturbance would be a clear distraction to the safe education of our young people.

### The protection of children from harm

For example underage sales, exposure to certain performances

The classroom windows look out over the surrounding streets, including where the One Stop is proposed, and this will mean that children will be able to observe the selling of alcohol and the possible associated behaviour issues that often occur outside such shops. Witnessing any such issues is likely to impact on them feeling safe at school as they will need to pass this shop on entering and exiting the school. This may result in our anxious pupils not attending school and impacting negatively on their mental health, education, wellbeing and risk of grooming and child exploitation.

In addition, we are working hard with some of our pupils around healthy living and positive behaviours. Having a shop so close will make it easier for pupils to attempt to purchase alcohol and other prohibited items eg vapes or ask adults to do so on their behalf. This again increases the risk to our most vulnerable pupils.

I hope you will consider carefully the negative impact that this type of shop will have on the wellbeing of our pupils, including those most vulnerable.

#### Dear Sir/Madam

I am writing to object to the proposal for a One Stop Shop to be opened directly opposite Millbay Academy. The sale of alcohol, smoking paraphernalia etc is of particular concern, by One Stop Stores Limited at One Stop, Cargo 2, Millbay Road, Plymouth, Devon, PLI 3NG.

This store will be directly alongside Millbay Academy. Millbay Academy is a school for children aged 4-16. We have over 25% of our children with additional and special educational needs and disabilities, as well as high levels of safeguarding concerns, and social care involvement, for our children and families.

As an Academy we already face significant challenges within the immediate area around us including: drug use, a local drug and alcohol shelter, a homeless shelter that helps adults with challenges and health issues, restorative justice, and at times sex workers at the rear of the building. We also are within walking distance of the local pupil referral unit (ACE), with students that, at times can cause challenges by arriving outside of the school perimeter.

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I hope you will consider carefully the negative impact that this type of shop will have on the wellbeing of our pupils, including those most vulnerable.
