The major proportion of the organisations who have paid are from education, but other organisations who have attended include those from housing and the voluntary and community sector. The concerns over some organisations not being able to afford the training has been investigated with work instigated to provide alternative forms of training. Training sessions have been arranged for 'trainers' within some organisations to enable them to deliver sessions to their colleagues. In addition, video sessions of core training are being recorded for multi-agency staff to view without having to attend a specific PSCP learning event. There is scope for organisations with hardships to apply to PSCP to be exempted from having to pay with each case assessed on its merits.

The PSCP website is being updated to ensure current and relevant advice relating to online safety is available to parents and carers.

Learning events are being scoped to provide parents and carers with information about child safeguarding. Parents and carers are being canvassed to establish which topics they would wish to be covered. If online safety is identified as a priority, a learning event will be delivered and made available subsequently as a video.

Online safety is considered by education providers across Plymouth and work is being undertaken to assess if there are any gaps. Inputs are provided from Key Stage I across to Key Stage 4 in age-appropriate sessions.

School visits show there are a range of approaches used to safeguard children. The IT systems within schools are subject of monitoring technology that enables staff to identify when material or 'words' of concern are encountered. Staff then investigate further with the relevant children or staff and act. Examples have been given to the partnership that shows this is happening routinely.

Children are provided with inputs within IT science and Personal, Social and Health Education (PSHE) sessions. Some schools provide additional information through assemblies or other school, year, or key stage forums. Examples provided to the partnership, show the inputs are relevant and current.
