What is Soft Tissue Sarcoma?

- A cancer that begins in the muscle, fat, fibrous tissue, blood vessels, or other soft tissue of the body
- A rare cancer that accounts for about 1% of all malignant tumours
- The cause of most cases of soft tissue sarcoma is not known. However there are certain risk factors for the development of soft tissue sarcomas

Best Treatment

- National Cancer Action Team's Improving Outcomes Guidance (IOG) explanation
- A specialist treatment centre for every 2-3 million people
- Standards for diagnostic and treatment services supported including multidisciplinary team working





Key aims of new service

- Improve patient safety and survival
- Improve clinical outcomes
- Improve the patient experience
- Ensure patients receive the highest quality soft tissue sarcoma treatment – delivered by experts
- Ensure early and accurate detection and diagnosis
- Ensure the quality of clinical services is the same across the South West





Stage 1 – Proposed

Plans

- Two specialised centres one in the Avon,
 Somerset & Wiltshire Cancer Network area and one in the Peninsula Cancer Network area
- Shared Care Model allowing follow up treatment closer to home
- Collaboration across the two Cancer Networks to achieve the highest possible standards of patient care.





Next Steps

- Procurement process through Autumn/Winter 2009
- Stage 2 Final recommendations to HOSCs identifying the providers for each Network
- Contracts commence April 2010
