1.1 On the 28th August 2009 the licensing department received an application from Karen Willis for the Grant of a Premises Licence under Section 17 of the Licensing Act 2003 in respect of H J Wines situated at 90 Embankment Road, Cattedown, Plymouth.

The author of (Appendix 4) prepared a petition (Appendix 5) which contains 167 signatures.

4.0 CONSIDERATIONS

- 4.1 The Committee is obliged to determine this application with a view to promoting the licensing objectives, which are:
 - the prevention of crime and disorder;
 - public safety;
 - the prevention of public nuisance;
 - the protection of children from harm.

In making its decision the Committee is also obliged to have regard to the guidance issued under section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 and the Council's own Licensing Policy and the representations (including supporting information) presented by all the parties.

The Committee must take such of the following steps as it considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives:

- 1. Grant the licence as asked.
- 2. Modify the conditions of the licence, by altering or omitting or adding to them.
- 3. Reject the whole or part of the application.
- 4. It may also refuse to specify a designated premises supervisor and/or only allow certain requested licensable activities.

The Committee is asked to note that it may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must actually be necessary in order to promote the licensing objectives.

I am incensed that after you revoked the license of the Angel club next door (because of all the trouble) that you as a responsible council would even consider allowing this to go ahead with opening hours from 8 in the morning when all the school children are catching buses to Plymstock till 11 at night which is an hour after the Coop further up ther road shuts. We as residents will have to endure drunks on our doorsteps making noise, urinating in doorways and all the other anti social behavour that goes with drink.

It is totally unfair to the off license we already have in Prince Rock, the owner has work very hard over the last 4 years to turn her shop around and make it into a respectable shop and doing her part to cut down on youngsters buying drink and being drunk. I am surprised that the Police have even entertained the idea.

I would like to raise an objection to the granting of a Premises Licence for the above named property.

As a resident of the area for over 40 years I feel that we have more than an adequate number of premises that sell alcohol in the area. Whilst I am aware that Plymouth City Council does not operate a Saturation Policy with regards the issuing of Premises Licences I strongly would urge you to think carefully before granting the Licence.

We have in the past, had a lot of alcohol related incidents in the community, incidents including fighting, swearing, smashing windows, abuse to the public and all other manner of things related people drinking alcohol.

The property for this Licence is situated next door to the what was formerly the Angel Club on Embankment Road, this club has had it licence revoked due to some of the reasons outlined above, it would therefore seem in appropriate to grant a Licence to the next door property.

If the granting of the Licence were to go ahead I would ask that you reconsider the hours of the licence. At the present all the establishments in the area that sell alcohol in retail premises close at 10pm. To have another selling alcohol until 11pm will only I feel lead to more incidents in the area.

At the present all the youngsters in the area congregate in the local park in the summer months and drink alcohol, it seems to be a good thing that they can no longer purchase alcohol after 10pm. If they were allowed to purchase alcohol after this time I feel it would only lead to more problems occurring.

It would also then maybe encourage other business in the area to stay open later selling alcohol and price wars regarding alcohol may ensue. This would only lead to alcohol being more readily available in the area especially to those who tend to cause trouble and would therefore lead to a rise in these alcohol related incidents.

Whilst I am sure that the applicants will behave in a responsible manner with regards to the Licence and that they have the perfect right to open a business in competition with others in the area, I wonder if they have taken into account the community and their needs, and if they have done any research in the area to establish local feelings and the problems that we face as a community with the drinking of alcohol and its effects on us.

I have consulted with residents in the area who are greatly concerned and somewhat confused as to why we need another establishment selling alcohol in an area already having problems with regards alcohol.

I trust that you will read and consider the points that I have outlined in this letter and take into account the feelings of the general public that reside in the area.

Our local shop, Embankment Stores, has been running for many years and is the main stay for many local residents, lots of who are elderly, and rely a lot on the shop for day-to-day essentials, i.e. bread, milk and tea, not to mention important things like toiletries, over the counter medicines, foods and drinks.

Also, as well as children going there to purchase sweets and fizzy pop, it's a licensed alcohol and tobacco retailer, which makes it a general convenience store, for nearly every requirement.

Unfortunately, its existence is being threatened by an application for a new dawn-till-dusk Off License, which may be placed on Embankment Road, a 5 -10 minute walk away from the present Off License. This coupled with the new road system, which will already take away passing trade, may cause our lovely little shop to be shut down due to lack of custom. Not to mention the possibility of Anti Social Behaviour late at night, as happened before the Angel Club closed.

As well as taking away the shop's business in Prince Rock, it could also add to the alcohol and broken bottle problem around the Prince Rock area.

Losing the convenient little shop may not only affect the local customers, but will also force the present staff into redundancy, which would be a great shame, because there has already been a lot of job cuts, and there aren't many jobs available.

A petition of over 200 locals is being submitted on Friday 25th to the Licensing committee - I would urge all people who rely on their local shops to make a stand- no matter where you are!
