4.0 CONSIDERATIONS

- 1. Grant the licence as asked.
- 2. Modify the conditions of the licence, by altering or omitting or adding to them.
- 3. Reject the whole or part of the application.
- 4. It may also refuse to specify a designated premises supervisor and/or only allow certain requested licensable activities.

The Committee is asked to note that it may not modify the conditions or reject the whole or part of the application merely because it considers it desirable to do so. It must actually be necessary in order to promote the licensing objectives.

The Text in bold are the conditions that this department will be putting before committee to be included in your operating schedule.

The text in italics is for your information.

- 1. This department recommends refusal of the supply of alcohol 'off' the premises.
- 2. Live Music will cease at 23.00hrs
- Provisions of facilities for making music i.e. karaoke shall cease indoors at 23 00hrs

Public Nuisance

 To prevent entertainment being intrusive, noise emanating from the premises will not be clearly audible 1 metre from the facade of the nearest residential property.

(If noise is clearly audible outside residential accommodation it has the potential to be a nuisance, for example, if the words and melody and be clearly distinguished)

2. The Licence Holder or nominated person (management) will control the sound levels of the music/ entertainment.

(This can be done by verbal agreement with performers, setting maximum levels on the amplifier/sound system or the installation of a sound limiter)

- 3. Doors and windows will be kept shut during live or regulated entertainment.
- 4. Staff will check prior to entertainment, and periodically during the entertainment, that all windows and doors are shut.
- 5. The Licence Holder or nominated person will assess the impact of any noisy activities on neighbouring premises at the start of the activity/entertainment and periodically throughout the activity/entertainment and take action to reduce noise levels if they are found to be excessive above background levels at the nearest residential property.

- Prominent, clear and legible notices shall be displayed at all exits requesting the public to respect the needs of local residents and to leave the premises and the area quietly. Avoid causing noise, nuisance or disturbance to local residents
- The Licence Holder or nominated person shall ensure that exits will be manned at closing time to ensure that patrons leave the area quickly and quietly as possible.

(Staff should be instructed to encourage patrons to move on as quietly as possible. the licence holder or a suitable member of staff should undertake this roll)

8. The use of external smoking areas

The designated outside smoking area shall not be used by patrons after 21.00 hrs for the purpose of an external drinking area. It may be used for the purpose of an outside smoking area only after this time. This area must be supervised by staff to ensure patrons do not congregate. Staff must ensure that patrons disperse back into the venue after smoking to prevent disturbance to neighbouring residential accommodation.

RE: Proposed Alcohol Licensing Of Pavilion Café, Devonport Park

It was with dismay that on return from my recent holiday and whist walking through Devonport Park I noticed the sign on the fencing for an application to sell alcohol at the new Pavilion Café. The application is that they be licensed to serve alcohol from 7a.m. till 00.30a.m, seven days a week in what was a tearoom facility.

I strongly object to the granting of this licence on the following grounds:

- Clients at and other Care Homes in the area are vulnerable adults and their safety could be compromised.
- 2. The park is already a gathering place for persons who use the park as a place to sit and drink alcohol, behaving inappropriately and being verbally and physically abusive if you attempt to confront them. We are aware of two vagrants who are currently sleeping rough in the park and no action has been taken over them.
- The park with its new improved play areas is supposed to be a child friendly space. Not so if they are subjected to witnessing drunken behaviour.
- The park without alcohol sales is not a very safe place at times, there are still
 muggings happening. I fear these could increase.

- 5. The parking in this area is very limited, where do they propose the increases in cars are parked?
- 6. The park is still poorly lit in areas and there are still incidents of vandalism occurring, again I fear these will increase.
- 7. Staff leaving the home in the evening already are weary when crossing the park and would feel even more reluctant to do so with the increased threat of having people who have been drinking to contend with.
- 8. I am concerned about the impact of the increase in noise particularly late night if the Pavilion is to be opened for such long licensing hours.
- 9. Will there be an increase in policing of the park should the license be granted?

I would appreciate that you register my objections and give them consideration when making the final decision on granting this license for extended alcohol sales.

I am writing this letter to raise my grave concerns to the licensing application made for an alcohol / entertainment licence for the Bowling/Café/Bar building in Devonport Park. Being one of the directors of

3, We have had on many occasions where stones have been thrown at windows either cracking or smashing them, which in turn really frightens our clients and causes at lot of stress and that the ease of obtaining alcohol in close proximity to the home could escalate these occasions and cause unnecessary stress and be very unnerving for them.

We have been aware that there have been a number of incidents in devonport park of physical attacks or intimidation by people under the influence of alcohol and again this would have the potential to increase with easier access to alcohol.

has 27 elderly clients which a very high percentage wish to go to bed early at approximately 20.00 - 20.30, we understand that an entertainment licence has been applied for and again with vulnerable adults any noise or rowdy behaviour will impact on our clients well being.

Another issue that concerns us the lack of parking facilities around the area and as has a 75% liability for the upkeep of the access road into the park we do not want to see any unnecessary traffic using it i.e., parking up the side of this just to get to the pavilion. Also it must be made aware that we could have emergency vehicles wanting to use this road any time of night or day, and any cars parked could stop these vehicles from reaching the care home.

We hope that as is quoted in all local press that this is a caring council I hope the same ethos will be applied when looking at this application for the alcohol/entertainment licence and the impact it will have on our clients.

Home for the elderly I think this would be extremely detrimental to the safety of my vulnerable clients on a safety issue and a noise one, I have already had to contact the police on a number of occasions because of stones being thrown at the bedroom windows of the home and at times windows being smashed surely adding alcohol to this situation will only worsen this and put my vulnerable clients at higher risk. My staffs are already perturbed when they have to walk through the park without the added worry of having people under the influence of alcohol wandering around also. I am writing on behalf of many very worried clients most of which have always lived in the Devonport area and are most disturbed by the thought of this as well as my staff.
