Executive Summary:

We have received an application from an employee of the Council requesting permission to remove a Sycamore tree that has significant decay at the base and to trim back another Sycamore tree by 1.5-2m from the side of the house. Both trees form part of a group protected by Tree Preservation Order no. 228 Whitleigh Lodge, Budshead, Plymouth.

Dealing with applications for works to protected trees is a routine exercise for the local planning authority. There are no additional financial costs arising from the processing of these applications that are not included in existing budgets.

Recommendations & Reasons for recommended action:

To give consent for the works and to require a condition to replace the tree with a suitable species in the next available planting season.

Reason: the decayed tree needs to be made safe. The loss of an adjacent Sycamore in the recent storms has meant its shelter has been lost and this tree with a decayed stem may be prone to wind throw. The trimming back from the side of the house is sensible management to prevent future damage to the building.

Alternative options considered and reasons for recommended action:

To refuse consent: the structural condition of the tree at the base that the applicant has applied to fell is poor – to refuse consent for its removal would be inappropriate. The trimming of the other Sycamore is necessary to prevent interference with the side of the house, no other option is available.



Background Report

I. Introduction

- 1.1 Under delegated authority on the 20th December 1990, Tree Preservation Order No.228 was made to protect various trees at Whitleigh Lodge, Budshead, Plymouth.
- 1.2 An application has been received from an employee of the council to carry out works to two trees protected by the above order and under our delegated procedures any such application is required to be reported to the Planning Committee.



2. Assessment of Application

The owner has applied for the following work:-

2.1 T1 – Sycamore – fell

This tree has a large area of decay at the base (see photo below). An adjacent tree was recently lost in the storms (T2) on plan and this tree is now exposed and may be prone to wind throw. It is therefore considered that the application to fell the tree should be approved on safety grounds. A condition to replace the tree with a suitable species in the next available planting season will be applied.



2.2 T2 – Sycamore

This tree was blown down in the recent gales.

2.3 T3 – Sycamore adjacent to side of house Trim back growth closest to house by 1.5 -2m. This work is required to prevent interference with the roof and side of the house.

3. Conclusion

3.1 In view of the above assessment it is considered that the application should be granted consent.
