2. Data sets.

The Department for Education (DfE) collect and compile data each January. Each summer, the DfE publish and share the compiled, and verified, data as Statistical First Release national tables. These national tables include data from maintained schools, academies, free schools, special schools, PRUs and independent schools.

Plymouth LA-held data sets are compiled from the schools' January Census returns, via pupil level annual school census (PLASC) returns and exclude Independent school data;

All data sets are used to inform SEND planning.

The data sets described in this section have been separated into national and Plymouth-held data and the source is identified accordingly.

This data set refers to schools only.





Table 2. Plymouth data, taken from the PLASC return, showing numbers of pupils at SEN Support and with an EHCP (listed as Formal SEN).







Early Years data

The child level early years census ensures that individual level data on 2, 3 and 4 year old children in early years settings is available in a similar manner to that collected on children in mainstream via the school census. This enables a more accurate distribution of funding to schools and local authorities, better demonstration of proper accountability of expenditure in this area and better evaluation and formulation of policy. However, better use of this data, and more effective communication on how this is used within planning SEND provision would be beneficial.
